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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I mean some counties are...I think share a clerk and treasurer. I don't know about assessor. Other counties, like mine, have three different offices, and unless they were computerized, I think it would be running between offices, duplication of records, or something, especially if they were...you were saying they are going to be filed back in the original offices after the transaction was completed. So I would assume computerization would aid this process.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Probably would but that would be up to a county. By making it "may"...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Did you introduce it as a "shall" when you started?

SENATOR LINDSAY: No. It was introduced as a "may" and it was introduced limited to Douglas County. It was expanded to any county by the Transportation Committee but it is and does remain permissive. It does remain a "may". The county board may make that choice. In your case, if the county board says we wait until we get computerized, then you wait until you get computerized.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, I will support too. I am a little concerned until I consult my file on this because I did have some letters. Thank you.

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Conway and members, this is an ability that has been a long time coming. It isn't mandated. County boards have talked about this for years in looking for ways to be more efficient. This is one way to do that, and when you don't mandate something on the county boards, it is their option. I mean they can look at it to see what it is like, and if it is more efficient, you can look at it, talk to the officials, come up with the conclusion. It is a great amendment. I urge your support. Thank you.

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Lindsay would be...waives off. Senator Beyer.

SENATOR BEYER: Well, Mr. Speaker and colleagues. This was discussed in Transportation Committee as Senator Lindsay said, and I think some of us contacted our county people, and they
