SENATOR HALL: That...that aren't, in other words, they don't have the...they're not an RN; they're not an LPN. They work for a doctor; they've worked for a doctor for 20 years. They've been doing this.

SENATOR WESELY: Yeah.

SENATOR HALL: And now the ruling says that they can no longer do this. Is that what we're looking at?

SENATOR WESELY: Frankly, yes, that's exactly right.

SENATOR HALL: I just, I bring it do the body--thank you, Senator Wesely.

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR HALL: I bring it to the body's attention, Mr. Speaker. I...basically it appears that it's nothing more than a codification of practice to date, but I think the issue is one that could cause problems down the road if it becomes too expansive. I believe that Senator Wesely has his arms around it, and understands it, and it's not going to get out of control; but, I also just want to raise the question with regard to what it could provide for, and I believe that if it passed through the 407 process, if the Department of Health has their eyes on it, that it's not going to be an issue, but I just want
