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next year. And so I think it's, every one of you get a few phone calls that nobody likes a few fees increasing, I don't like those either and I am not going to stand here and be crazy about them, but I guess it is a very logical way to get the money, one, to fund the Department of Motor Vehicles; two, to make some strides forward in how they operate as far as VTR, as far as a more, I would argue, a much more, bring the whole licensing process in our state into the 1980s and nineties, and get it away from the early seventies and do something that makes sense. And I guess if that is what it takes, yeah, sure you can appropriate the General Fund dollars to do that, but there is not the General Fund dollars to do that. I think the people in the State of Nebraska need to have a system that brings them into this century, and I guess I am willing to raise the fees to do that, knowing that it is not that popular, but probably more important, it is one of those things that if you are not willing to cash fund an agency like this, you will have to tap into the General Fund, and there will not be General Fund dollars there. We need to fund Medicaid. We need to fund mental retardation. We need to fund education. Those things don't have a user fee that can drive them. So with that, I'd rise to oppose Senator Kristensen's amendment. I think that's probably the most misunderstood part of the bill, obviously, and if that is what it takes to get rid of it and then get the rest of the bill to pass,...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR MOORE: ...that's fine, but I think you need to think a little bit of what you are doing. I think you are catering to a few spe... I think you're really, by withdrawing the amendment or taking that part of the amendment out, you are catering to a few narrow interests in the body that may choose to paint you in a corner, but the whole issue is to get those fees down where more people can afford them, where more people will use them, and I see no harm done by that. And so I'd rise to oppose Senator Kristensen's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Moore. Senator Bohlke, you are next.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Mr. President and members, Senator Kristensen, question. If we pass your amendment, and then as I understand it, Senator Bernard-Stevens will have an amendment to divide the question, will we, at that time, then at this place in time have
