SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Moore. Senator Bohlke. Senator Bohlke. Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Robak.

SENATOR ROBAK: Mr. Speaker, I move that we bracket this bill until four o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Speaker, the reason I'm offering this bracket motion is that between now and four o'clock we could get our heads together and maybe perhaps we would know what we stand on these amendments and give us more time to go onto General File, and between four and five when we go onto Select in one hour I think that we could clear up our little disagreements and get to a vote on LB 1092.

SPEAKER BAACK: You can have a request to unanimous consent to bracket the bill.

SENATOR ROBAK: Well, I request that we bracket the bill till four o'clock this afternoon. Could we go machine vote? I don't understand the procedure from now on.

SPEAKER BAACK: Well, I'm not so sure that we can do it to a time certain of...to a certain hour. I'm not so sure that you can bracket a bill to a certain hour. We're talking about usually we bracket to a date, to a date certain but not to a specific hour.

SENATOR ROBAK: When you say usually, is there a rule on this?

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Robak, in the past, to a time certain has always meant to a certain day and the Speaker's agenda is what determines what time a bill will come up during that day. So, I mean, you could have unanimous consent or you can bracket the bill but that does not guarantee that it will be back up this afternoon.

SENATOR ROBAK: I guess I will ask Senator to...Senator Kristensen. Mr. Speaker, I will withdraw my motion.

SPEAKER BAACK: It is withdrawn. Senator Hefner, you're next.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I'm rising to support Senator Chambers' amendment. I think his increase is a little more realistic. His would go from \$10 to \$14. I thought that the \$10 to \$16 was a little steep. This is a 60 percent increase of one time. And I realize it's over four years but,
