SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, the first amendment, Senator, takes out the presumption of the 90 minutes. Remember, that was a problem of relating back to the time of the taking the test from the time of the arrest?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And then the zero tolerance that you just discussed. AM3901 also takes out the ALR, but the second amendment would allow us to have a vote up or down on ALR. But for your purposes, the things that you're complaining about are taken out by, if adopted, AM3901 that I'm going to propose here as soon as we're done.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, and since Senator Kristensen gave me the rest of his time, I will say this, as former President Nixon used to say, about that. Since your amendment definitely takes out the portion that I'm concerned about and you're offering the amendment almost assures its acceptance, I'm going to withdraw my amendment, but that does not indicate what I might do with reference to the bill because I don't like the bill. But I don't want to take time chewing this cud when you're going to pulverize it. So with that, Mr. Clerk, I would withdraw that amendment that I have pending now.

SPEAKER BAACK: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have to the bill, Senator Kristensen, AM3829.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I would ask unanimous consent to substitute AM3901 for that amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: No objection, so ordered.

CLERK: I might add, Senator, 3901, the members will find that in your bill books. It is printed separately, AM3901 will be in your bill books.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Clerk, for that and, members, if you will turn to that, if you will also look on your desk I have a handout memo that summarizes the two amendments that I'm going to be speaking about. I want to take you back
