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probation officer or someone looking at them and watching them and so on, but I just simply cannot understand why you want to stop this bill. It's time for us, as I said earlier, to do something significant about drunk driving and each time you bring an amendment like this all it does is slow it down. If you want to stay here till midnight, fine, I'll stay with you. Thank you.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you. Senator Hall, the 30 day imprisonment is already, that's old language if you will look at the bill.

SENATOR HALL: That's correct, but it's...

SENATOR PIRSCH: I'm not asking you, I'm telling you.

SENATOR HALL: Excuse me.

SENATOR PIRSCH: If you look under second conviction, mandatory 30 days imprisonment and \$500 fine. Now I know you're going to argue that doesn't say mandatory minimum, minimum is the new word, but as far as I am concerned mandatory means mandatory and 30 days is what it is now. There is not going to be any increase in our jail and prison. It's amazing how many times that argument is used when you want to defeat a fine, but this is now in the law, mandatory 30 days imprisonment and \$500 fine for second offense. What you want to do is reduce that to seven which is the same now as the mandatory minimum under first conviction and that is also in the law now. I have no problem with 30 days imprisonment even if we were changing it upwards to that which we are not. They have so many creative punishments now for DWI. We have house arrests, we have electronic surveillance, you can serve it on the weekend, you can do all kinds of things so you won't lose your job and it's not going to increase prison costs, and I think that's a bogus argument and I think if we say second conviction should be greater than first conviction, we should leave it as it presently is in the law, 30 days imprisonment.
