could be guilty of motor vehicle homicide. You also could be doing it...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...for example, reckless driving or careless driving, that's the reason we reference 669.07, which is a driving while intoxicated offense.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, so it is married to what the subject matter of the bill is.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes, exactly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And I kind of see a little connection now for the wide range. But I'm wondering if somebody, on a first offense of drunk driving killed a person, it would be considered so minor...I won't pursue that right now, I'll just think it through. Then what I want to ask you about, the next time I turn my light on, is the sentence at the end of this provision, the revocation shall not run concurrently with any jail term imposed, based on the notion that the person, while in jail, say they do get jail time under the felony conviction, took some AA and other treatment. But when they come out it's as though they did nothing and they have the full period of revocation still facing them, which...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...(inaudible) 15 years.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers, your light is on again.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What I was trying to get at, Senator Kristensen, is that a person, I'll presume that they get some jail time on the motor vehicular homicide. And let's say it's the maximum they can get, a third of 5 years, up to 5 years, and they serve that period of time that is required to be eligible for parole, and a condition of their parole is that they have to finish this AA, or whatever they give them in prison.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Um-huh.
