SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Now, if there is some question, what will occur? Senator Lindsay's an awful good lawyer, he knows what to do, he'll file an appeal in the district court, district court will probably pin that for the...stay it for the pending of the criminal case. If indeed there's been some misrepresentation, or the case shouldn't have been brought, or there is a finding of guilty, the amendment provides for that. And I guess I became relatively comfortable with ALR through the proceedings. My initial dislike, disdain, distaste for ALR, as I've gone along and done reading, has dissipated. And I think it's a reasonably good policy. If driving does become a right in the State of Nebraska, ALR won't survive for ten minutes. And what Senator Lindsay says is true, maybe our court some day will do that. But if we're going to take out Intoxilyzers, that's going to reduce the way to take drunk driving...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.
