

you have the next amendment, Senator. Pull them? Mr. President, I have nothing further pending to LB 291 at this time.

SPEAKER BAACK: We are on LB 291. Anyone wishing to speak to the advancement of LB 291? Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm not going to keep this going very long, I'm just going to talk this time and sit down. But let me tell you a story about a country who was having a lot of social problems. The people were just going nuts out on the streets, they were getting big crowds together to...to demonstrate against the government. The press was going nuts against the government. The people weren't paying their taxes, just simply weren't doing what they were supposed to be doing. So the reaction was the government said, here's what we'll do, we're going to start quartering soldiers in people's houses. We're going to start, we're going to not let them print all this stuff against the government. We're going to not let them assemble and make all these...have these marches and demonstrations. We're going to have all sorts of crazy taxes on them. We're going to tax their newspapers, we're going to tax their tea. As you know what happened was we said no, you're not going to do that to us. And it was so important that we adopted a Bill of Rights and the United States Constitution to prohibit those kinds of things from occurring. And the reason I bring this up is to emphasize what Senator Chambers did. We can have a lot of social evils, and drunk driving is a social evil. It's something that should not occur. But how far do you go to prevent it from occurring. Let's look at that federal legislation that's being shoved at us. Let's look at what Washington is telling us to do. It's telling us we have to do this, but it doesn't stop there. There are five things that we have to do to get this money, or four out of those five things I should say. The next one that's going to be coming up is going to be a statewide program of nondiscriminatory road blocks. How are those going to do over in your area when you go back and say, ah, we had to do what Washington told us we had to. They are going to be required, I guarantee you it's going to be coming here in the next couple of years, because Washington told us we had to do it. They're going to be setting up road blocks, when you're driving home from the Legislature, to see if you've been driving drunk. They're going to be stopping your people when they're driving home from town, after church, to see if they've been driving drunk. And they're going to be required,
