

SENATOR CONWAY: One minute.

SENATOR HORGAN: ...the person driving that automobile know that. And if we tell them that they're not responsible for what's going on in their automobile, then our law doesn't make much sense.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Horgan. I think the way the law is as you're drafting it makes no sense and this again is why old people like you all could go try to communicate with young people and tell them why they ought to pay attention to you, and you say you ought to pay attention to me because if Jessie does something wrong, I'm going to punish Brad. Jessie said it's a good idea and that might be so. But that's the way you talk to them and that's the way you treat them and then you wonder why they look at you like you haven't got good sense, because they have drawn a proper conclusion and that's what this kind of law is and you have to talk about it like this to make people see what it is and see what a sham it is. We're not interested in safety. The only reason this bill has gotten this far is because you're afraid that the federal government might cut off some money. And if you would say that, you'd take away a lot of my arguments. But to pretend that safety is the concern...

SENATOR CONWAY: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...makes it something bordering on less than strict candor.
