

payers of the fees will be utility companies. And I will pass out to you shortly a chart showing projected payments from different entities within the state. There is a civil penalty section and a criminal penalty section, both of which are designed to be the minimal that we can do and comply with federal law. And those sections are required by federal law. We have done no more than what has been required by federal law.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. Speaker, members, I'd like to ask Senator Beutler a question, first.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Beutler, would you respond, please.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: What bill...what...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...what bill is this?

SENATOR BEUTLER: This is 1122, Senator.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. I haven't had a chance, we're moving along awful fast. I really wanted to go back and ask Senator Landis what we did on that last one, if that's appropriate. But I also am not sure the germaneness of this. We're talking about Clean Air Act in this bill, the other one is solid waste. And I...as a quick perusal of this, I'm not sure what we're doing here.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator, did you want Senator Landis to respond?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I'd have Senator Landis, I want just a brief one, but we went over that so fast I felt very uncomfortable.

SENATOR LANDIS: Fair enough. The reason it came up twice is because there was a first one, which was not drafted well, and I was to have substituted the second one. E & R says that they can take care of the problem and we don't have to do anything about it. What it did was to say this, solid waste projects fall under the limited referendum for local issues. There's a hearing, there's special notice, everyone knows that the project is going on. The chance to create an objection and to have a referendum on what the local municipal subdivision does occurs
