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effort, it would be appropriate to review it, whether progress has been made, whether the potential is there to rectify the situation. And if that is not the case, then certainly we need to make a decision, does this go on indefinitely or does some action take place to permanently place the child outside of that home. I think we're all looking for decisions that are wise and just and not delayed beyond reasonable time frame. And to balance all that out is difficult, but I think this is a reasonable amendment so I would rise in support of it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Wesely. Senator Rasmussen, you're next.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I rise in support of the Landis amendment, too. I simply want to point out that one of the things that was made very clear in the hearing is that we may not be providing the most appropriate services which is the language here that if parents have not, once appropriate services have been provided, if parents still are not able to have the children back, return back to their custody that we would look at termination. I think we still have a serious question whether or not we have appropriate services for these families. We tend to send them off to things that are not always culturally sensitive, that are not always based on making true differences in behaviors. And I would just simply remind the body although it's really important that we try and look at the time that children are spending out of the home but we are also, in the future, going to continue to need to look at what are reasonable and appropriate services to provide in support of families. With that, I would simply urge that you do support this amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Rasmussen. Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Yes, Mr. Speaker, I will concur with Senator Landis. We need to keep this brief. I also rise in support of this amendment. I think it's a very positive step forward for children in the State of Nebraska and I would urge its adoption.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Byars. Senator Hall.
