

Education Committee to look into this and she contacted the School Boards Association and the School Boards Association's information is that teachers, basically, now, school boards, basically, now need to comply with what LB 415 will be if it passes, and that is that they do not have to give specific name information for their employees, that they are not forced to do that. They can do that if they choose to do so. And I think that...and I assume, Senator Will, that that's the case with cities too. If a city wants to publish this information by name, they will be able to if this bill passes? Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Yeah, absolutely, Senator Withem.

SENATOR WITHEM: Okay.

SENATOR WILL: It just doesn't prevent a city from doing anything.

SENATOR WITHEM: Okay, so it's my understanding, if this bill passes, it will treat school district...treat cities of the first and second class the same way that school districts are basically treated today, that school districts do not have an obligation. As a matter of fact, there was a St. Paul decision, which I don't know what that...what that dealt with but had gone to the Supreme Court and so there is no affirmative statutory obligation on school districts. And if that was a rationale that some people had for opposing this bill that it gave cities an opportunity to do things, avoid doing things that school districts have to do, that is not a good reason for opposing the bill at this point. That being said, I would withdraw the motion.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion is withdrawn. Since there is nothing further on the bill, we will proceed with Final Reading. Would the senators please be seated. Please proceed, Mr. Clerk.
