

much now. Better to do a little as to do nothing, and I think doing nothing and letting this statute continue the way it is is wrong and, therefore, I would urge the body to accept this little bit, this little piece in the pie so that if a dog knocks somebody down and they're hurt or injured or worried or wounded that they can recover damages and, in this case, all the lady wanted was to recover some insurance damages and I think it was inappropriate that she could not and I think this act could happen again between now and the next legislative session and I encourage you to bring it back. But we were not ready for a long floor fight on this issue and so this was what we wanted to do, just insert the word "injury" so that in the case that an unfortunate person is harmed again by a dog they have a recourse and can recover damages.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Does anyone else wish to speak to this motion? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, to try to save time...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) This is democracy in action, participatory democracy. I'm going to withdraw that motion and just ask that we not vote aye and it will save time.

CLERK: Well, Madam President, I think I just need to withdraw Senator Schrock and Lynch want amendments printed, Senator, withdraw those, and, Senator Will, you had amendments, Senator. Wish to withdraw? Thank you. That's all that I had, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Okay. Would the senators please be seated then so we can proceed. Proceed with Final Reading on LB 1011.

CLERK: (Read LB 1011 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 1011 pass?
