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PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: I will attempt to answer that, Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Moore, is there anything on the ballot, a constitutional amendment or anything like that, that pertains to Commonwealth?

SENATOR MOORE: I, if my memory serves me correctly, I believe there is. On the lottery issue, there's a separate provision that would allow those proceeds to be...go towards eliminating or paying off...I guess I hate the word payoff but I guess that's the word I will use. I believe that's on the (inaudible). Some...if I'm incorrect, I hope someone would speak up and correct me, but, yes, I believe that is on the ballot for the November election.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, then I would suggest to this body that let's see how the vote comes out on that issue before we start another issue that may get in the way, or confuse, or upset, or derail the issue on the ballot, which it can and would do. I have another question of Senator Moore. Senator Moore, have we had an Attorney General's Opinion in the past pertaining to this issue?

SENATOR MOORE: Oh, I would...I would only guess we've had dozens, but I could be incorrect.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes or no?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, I can't answer "yes". I'm not aware of any, but I...my instincts tell me there's several out there.

SENATOR HABERMAN: And were they for or against the issue?

SENATOR MOORE: Since I'm unaware of them, I can't...I don't know.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay. Thank you. Senator Landis, a question, please.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes.

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
