

SENATOR SCHELPEPER: I said it is going to have to be challenged in court, yes, because the Attorney General has ruled it is unconstitutional. So in order to have a law, you have to challenge it in the courts, and so it will be challenged in the courts. I don't know if it is going to be done by the tracks, but they are talking about making sure that it is constitutional.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, you have given Ak-Sar-Ben what they want. They want a chance to challenge the Constitution. You have given them that by buckling, folding, and letting your spine turn from Jello into slush. Now you are going to give them money, which I think the discussion has shown is not going to be spent. There is no basis to appropriate this money wherever it comes from. If we were going to take up a collection here, there is no justifiable cause to pass this A bill. Now when Senator Schellpeper was talking, I do remember fairly well. He said the tracks have said they are prepared to take this to court to challenge it, to test it, have it tested. He said the tracks would. I wouldn't have said that. Now, we are going to be back here in January. Ak-Sar-Ben will be no less strong next year than they are now. They will have had a chance to take a few people on trips, give them money for their campaigns, and do whatever other things lobbyists are able to do to generate this kind of power in the Legislature. But on this particular proposition, it is not necessary to crawl. Wait a minute, let me take that back. The Legislature has already crawled. It is not necessary to grovel. Let us not grovel. Let us walk upright on our feet as human beings with the power to reason are supposed to do. Were we to walk on all fours, our arms would be slung from our spine in the same way as that of a four-footed creature, who when he or she walks, the natural inclination is to look down at the ground, and it is with some effort that they raise their eyes to see where they are going. Human beings, when in...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...natural position, look forward because we are supposed to be looking to the future, doing those things that are upright and proper. I am going to see if this money is going to be appropriated when it is not going to be spent. I think the A bill ought not be overridden.
