SENATOR SCHIMEK: Oh, that is right, okay.

SPEAKER BAACK: That is why...that is why that scenario was (interruption)...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Can we debate it more than one round? If we had, say, 39 votes in that first day of discussion, would it be worth, you know, a motion to come back and discuss it again or is that the end of it?

SPEAKER BAACK: At that point I would guess that someone could file a reconsideration motion and that could be handled in that way in another day. But that is why it was only a one vote kind of deal.
