I'd probably have to pay on it because it would be an antique, but another question. Senator Lynch, how low should property tax be? I think we should ask that question. How low should it be and how can we keep it low? We have got to answer that question. Each year we increase it four, five, six percent, our problem won't be solved. We have got to do something with it. Maybe we should freeze property taxes. Boy, that will put a chill in some of them, won't it? Huh?

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR ROBINSON: One more comment, when I got my bill on 1059, I had a 17 percent saving on my school taxes, plus the 8 1/2 percent that the Legislature did before. All other subdivisions at least went up 10 percent. Food for thought. Thank you.
