

get any manuals out. I think Senator Warner had an idea about machinery, sure you could use a depreciation schedule but you take grain prices, they vary 30, 40 cents a bushel just over the width of the State of Nebraska. So I don't see how there could be any true, honest way to start assessing and I think that's another good reason to support the LR 1. But I think, Senator Schmit, I think he's going to introduce an amendment to this and I, truthfully, believe it's probably the best idea that we have heard in this special session. Thank you.

SENATOR WARNER: Thank you, Senator Rogers. Senator Crosby, followed by Senator Nelson.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and members, several of my questions have already been answered and that's the main thing of why I...that's the main reason I turned my light on because, as I've listened again this afternoon, I have gotten some more questions and I had some from constituents before that, Senator Hall, I know you get tired of answering questions and I don't see anybody else except you here, so...

SENATOR HALL: That's all right.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...it's just that I kind of like it said in public and for the record about household goods. Are they still not...are they still exempt? Are we going to have to declare our household goods, etcetera?

SENATOR HALL: No, under LB 6, as it was introduced through the Governor's provision and as they were addressed in MAPCO, they are not at risk. I would argue that they are...

SENATOR CROSBY: Yeah.

SENATOR HALL: ...they are not in jeopardy even though they...

SENATOR CROSBY: Still.

SENATOR HALL: ...are still under this...

SENATOR CROSBY: You know, the average person, that's what they start thinking about is their home and what they have in it.

SENATOR HALL: Right.
