

and I don't think a lot of the body realizes it. And then with the farm price supports set...froze for a five-year period of time, including inflation, we're talking about 50 cents a bushel there. So, as I say, this farm economy also affects my people in my district. So, at the present time, on LB 6, I attended the meetings the same with a lot of you folks, I'm not sure that we need LB 6 at this point. I think Senator Vard Johnson and Mr. Lyons had a little bit of a different opinion on that and maybe even Jack Mills whether or not the county assessors had that authority. I tend to support Senator Schmit in his amendment that will be coming up now. Senator Owen Elmer, I think, has the right idea. Let's let...wait and see. LB 829, at least there's a fairer way and if you pay depreciation, you take it off. There's a way of getting that on your tax bills and a way to know whether or not your depreciation. This other liar's tax, I don't know where we're going to end up at. And so, again, that's another one of the many problems of putting personal property tax back on the tax rolls. So I guess, at this point, I probably will not be supporting LB 6 but I'm not so sure either. I think we should wait for LB 829 to come into place. Thank you.
