

which could be subject to change but the proposal right now is a per bushel in...per bushel incentive through '98-99 and 2000 with the maximum dollars of \$5 million each year.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what does that mean? They're not going to...they're not going to have some kind of liability or obligation that ordinarily they would have to the state? What does that mean?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's where we would provide...continue the incentive beyond '97, up until '97, we have that statute is in place.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I want you to say what the incentive consists of.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Ten cents per bushel. It's in there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and the 10 cents refers to what?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Ten cents per bushel...per bushel, using producer credits. I thought I had it in there. It's...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: It's a maximum of \$5 million. It would be so many bushel times 10 cents with a maximum of \$5 million.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If they didn't have that incentive, what would...what would happen?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: They may not come.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I meant what would be the impact on this company of not getting these incentives? What would they have to do if they don't get these incentives?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, they wouldn't probably come.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not phrasing the question right. Okay. Thank you. Senator Schmit, I would like to ask you a question. Are you aware, Senator Schmit, that a few years ago Cargill demonstrated that they could import wheat into this country cheaper than it could be produced by domestic wheat growers?
