

going about the process. They have gotten counsel, and they have been counseled to the effect that they need to address this issue. They are going about it. Whether you pass LB 6 or not, a no vote does not keep that from happening. That is what I guess I want to make clear. What it does keep from happening is that the dates in terms of the filings, the dates in terms of the requirements for payment, the dates, other dates, and the ability to facilitate that on the part of the county assessors is severely hindered because they have to work with what they have, and they have very little in front of them. They have very little in front of them in the way of a statutory scheme that the Legislature has endorsed and said go about this. Now you may not like it. I guess the fact that you don't want to put personal property back on the rolls, I can understand that. The bill has been in front of you. It has been available. It was filed yesterday. It hasn't changed. I have seen things a lot thicker move a lot faster through this body. If you want to argue, find an excuse that it has moved too fast, you are going to find an excuse any way you look at it. But here is really where we are at. This motion to reconsider is on technical amendments to clean up the bill. Then you can argue on the bill, itself, when it comes to the issue of moving it off of General File over to E & R Initial, or make your arguments at that point. But if you don't vote to make this a better provision, in other words make it in your eyes, if you oppose this, a bad bill better, you still aren't moving it anywhere. You still have the ability to vote red on your philosophical grounds, I guess, at that point in time. Do that then, because if you vote red now, I guarantee you what you might as well do, if there aren't 25 votes to reconsider...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.
