

SENATOR HALL: Yes, and that's what you would have to do. You would have to, because everything would be exempted, except for business property.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. I understand now. I keep forgetting about that year framework in which...Okay, thank you very much.

SENATOR HALL: Yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I guess I don't know if other questions keep popping up in other people's heads like this, but I think that we need a full discussion, we need to make sure that we know what we're voting on. And I would be in favor of slowing the process down just a little bit. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Robak.

SENATOR ROBAK: Call the question.

PRESIDENT MOUL: We have a motion to cease debate. Are there sufficient seconds? Seeing five seconds, we will now vote on the motion to cease debate. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the motion to cease debate? Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 2 nays, Madam President, to cease debate.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Debate has ceased. I'll recognize Senator Hall for closing.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Madam President. The amendment again puts together the LB 6 version, the committee version of the proposal that was offered. The Governor's portion of the proposal is incorporated together to the white copy that you have in front of you. Again, it's...it would become the bill, so it would be the body of text that we would be working from. I would urge adoption of the amendment. It is clearly a much cleaner version than either of the two separately, and I hope you would support it.
