this way, and the amendment was adopted, that it would give the committee, that you're going to chair this summer, a chance to do some work on, one of the bright sides of it?

SENATOR HALL: Well, it would. It would...the problem is, Senator Rogers, I'm afraid that what's going to happen to that committee is that the focus is going to shift and it's going to deal specifically with personal property, and that wasn't the intent of it.

SENATOR ROGERS: No.

SENATOR HALL: The intent was to deal with the overall tax system.

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR HALL: And I'm afraid, no matter what comes out of this session, that's where the emphasis is going to lie, and maybe it should. But it's got to take into consideration all the other taxes. You know, I introduced LR 9, which was the one year proposal that said let's make sure that 829 is constitutional for 1991. And that was a constitutional amendment. And I may offer that on 1CA, I don't know.

SENATOR ROGERS: Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Rogers. Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I just, at this point, I, too, support the amendment that Senator Schmit has brought. I signed on the bill, LB 5, because I felt that we'd been given a directive to either tax everything or nothing, and I preferred the nothing approach. And this is what we've done with this piece of legislation, I think, is to provide us with the extending the date of LB 829 for six months, and we then, in effect, tax nothing until that time. Just my particular choice, my selection, I think this is what the people that I represent would want me to do, I know this is what they'd want me to do. So I'm going to support this one rather than the tax everything method. Thank you.
