

require to get an exemption, because we've seen too frequently too many exemptions, and that's led us to the point at which we're at today at this moment. So we should make it a little more difficult to take that step. If we take away the uniformity clause, at least that is one ounce, and that's about all it is, one ounce of additional preventive cure to the ails that we feel right now. The part of the amendment that Senator Chambers objects to is the same part I object to, though, is that after you get the exemption you will have 30 votes required to take it off. We just saw an example why that's a problem. The vote that we just took on LB 775 and earthmoving equipment, there were clearly just barely 25 votes. If we had had a requirement of 30 votes, we never would have been able to take the step we just took. That's indicative of what would happen in almost every other exemption. And even in this one that we took the vote on, I don't know if we weren't in this unique position that we'd come anywhere close to 25 votes, just because of the way people feel about taking away exemptions once they are granted, they are very difficult to take away. And so I'm not willing to support this effort to step back from the 30 vote barrier to having exemptions, because it makes sense in light of what we're doing. We're taking away a protection for the public with the uniformity clause. We're giving them back something, very small amount in the 30 vote, but unfortunately we've added on to that 30 votes the additional language that I will offer an amendment to strike. So I'm not going to support this amendment and suggest that perhaps there's another way to go. But I understand the concern that some have expressed, particularly with that additional language about not being able to take away exemptions once they are granted.
