SENATOR HALL: It's constitutional this year, nobody has address it yet.

SENATOR HALL: No court has addressed it.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes. Well, Senator, the last thing I want to...there's been some confusion from the Nebraska Farm Bureau's statements on this issue. I think Senator Landis summed it up, if that changes any votes, that would be interesting. But in all communications with them today, they have said they still support LR...the CA, they still support it, the thirty...They don't like LB 6, but they still support LR 1CA with the 30 votes.
