SENATOR LAMB: Okay.

SENATOR HALL: It probably doesn't have the votes. This amendment, if it was adopted by the public, by the electorate after being passed out of this body, there would be no need for LB 6 at present. If it was not, if it was rejected after the polls, only after being adopted here by this body, we'd be back in session implementing a form of LB 6. LB 6 has an E clause, it has a real rough road to hoe anyway. You could implement it without the E clause but you would jam everything up at the back end, and I don't know that it makes much difference at this point. If it doesn't have the E clause, maybe coming back on the 18th of September is just as well.

SENATOR LAMB: Okay, then as I understand the scenario, if the Hall amendment would be adopted, we would then suspend the rules so that we could treat LR 1 as a resolution. I mean this is a possible...instead of a bill. As I understand it, we have to suspend the rules to do that, is that correct?

SENATOR HALL: Well, Senator Lamb, that's...

SENATOR LAMB: That is what the Clerk tells me.

SENATOR HALL: ...that is true, in essence, what we would have to do is have it go up to Bill Drafter's, come back down, wait for it to be done and vote on it.

SENATOR LAMB: But we could do all that today?

SENATOR HALL: I don't see why not.

SENATOR LAMB: And then there would be no need to come back for another bill another time. We could then adjourn sine die, is that correct.

SENATOR HALL: And, Senator Lamb, that alternative has been there all day.

SENATOR LAMB: I love it. I think it will work. I think that's the best thing, we are going to get out of here. We are going to get two years of time here to consider what we are going to do, well, one year, one year, really. (Interruption).
