total is for \$78,621. That's based on a nine-day session. Should the session be able to run shorter than that an amendment to reduce the appropriation may be appropriate on Select File. To give you some idea of the...what is involved in the \$78,000, roughly 33,000 of it, again for a nine-day period, covers the per diems and mileage for the legislators that might be necessary. There's about \$6,600 that is in the way of temporary personnel, such as the Pages, Sergeant at Arms, Bill Room, so forth. And then finally there's a little over 33,000, 33,240 that would include the data processing, printing, telephone hookups that are necessary, those kind of items. And then finally 5,000 for computer time and printing to the Revisor's Office. And again, if it looks like we do not need to meet for nine days, why that appropriation can be reduced on General File. So I'll move that LB 2 be advanced to E & R for engross...E & R Initial.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Warner. Is there anyone who wishes to speak on this bill? Seeing none, do you have any further....We will now proceed to vote on the motion to advance LB 2. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the motion to advance LB 2? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of LB 2.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 2 is advanced. LB 1.

CLERK: Madam President, LB 1 was a bill introduced by Senators Warner, Landis, Withem, and Hall at the request of the Governor. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on July 31st of this year, Madam President, referred to the Revenue Committee. Revenue Committee reported the bill back to General File without committee amendments.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, as you know, LB 1 is the reenactment of LB 1063. As a precautionary measure of any constitutional question as to whether or not the legislation enacted prior to the adoption of Constitutional Amendment 1 has any potential constitutional flaw, and by reenacting the provisions of LB 1 that are necessary that cloud will no longer be there. There are some
