SENATOR MOORE: Well, I'm assuming here, and I don't want to get these people in trouble, but that's...you mean, then you...I'm sure there's somewhere else in the statute where you're guilty of lying on a tax form and stuff like that, you'd be guilty of there, and so I don't...I can't outline for you exactly how it happened. But, as with anything else, when you lie about any sort of tax you owe, the Department of Revenue, I know, has abilities and you are guilty of certain offenses by doing that.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: So the intent though is for this still...this area still to be policed in terms of a valid exemption. That's your point as I read the way you have the amendment drafted.

SENATOR MOORE: Well, it's drafted in a way you have the same ability to police. I don't know how much it's policed right now, arguably, but it would have...it would give the Department of Revenue the exact same information to do whatever they're going to do under the present law.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Does anybody else wish to speak to the committee amendments? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Hall?

SENATOR HALL: (Microphone not activated) ...members, I rise to support the original committee amendments and oppose Senator Moore's, but I can't split my vote so they're there. Two of them are technical in nature. One, I believe, is a substantive change and for that reason I am going to oppose the committee amendments at this point in time, but choose your poison.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Hall. We will now vote on the committee amendments. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted on the committee amendments? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 12 nays, Madam President, on adoption of the committee amendments.
