SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I was not going to speak on this particular amendment this morning, because I did support this solution out of committee, primarily so that the Special Session of the Legislature would, in fact, have a plan to begin to work to find the solution to address the Supreme Court's problems. Senator Beutler's conversation of some minutes past, though, prompted me to decide to visit with you just a little bit on the topic of redistricting and how the court's decision might well impact the actions of the Legislature in some future day. The decision of the court, and assumptions have to be made that they may we'll have elevated county lines to a standard of consideration that is greater than what we used in the debate on 614, and certainly
