SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the closing on the amendment offered by Senator Bernard-Stevens. We'll now vote on that amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the amendment offered by Senator Bernard-Stevens. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 3 ayes, 15 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: The motion fails. Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Mr. Speaker, I move the readvancement of LB 9 to E & R for engrossment.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the motion to readvance LB 9. All those in favor say aye. Opposed no. It is readvanced. We will now go back to LB 7.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 7 was discussed earlier today by the Legislature. I now have pending to the bill an amendment by Senator Conway. Senator, AM047S.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Conway.

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and members, we're at a point where we're getting a lot of maps and things and language on your desk, but if you could direct yourself to AM047S, I believe it is. (AM047S appears on pages 124-26 of the Legislative Journal.)

CLERK: AM047S, Senator.

SENATOR CONWAY: AM047S. In conjunction with 047S, you will also see a map that says amendment to LB 7, submitted by Senator Gerald Conway, a black and white smaller piece map on your desk. Also with that is attached a statistics sheet and before I even move any farther, I want to suggest the yeoman's work that Val Goodman has provided out of Legislative Research to take this amendment and have it available with stats and a map ready and reproduced, and also Bill Drafting for being able to change the language. If you turn to the map that you had, that is LB 7 as amended by committee that was adopted on General File, and there was some suggestion and this morning we got into this
