deal, the philosophy that Senator Schellpeper and I have had from the beginning, very minor. We're moving some townships that, for the most part, are rural townships, so we're not talking about heavy population density. We can subscribe to the same philosophy we started with, and that being trying to be fair to the residents of, the 32,212 people in the district, but we have provided a better look, and if the body feels that they can stand behind that look, I'd appreciate that. So, I will ask the body to adopt this amendment to LB 7.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the closing on the amendment offered by Senator Conway. We will now vote on the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the amendment by Senator Conway. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 3 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: I have nothing further pending to LB 7 at this time, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Mr. Speaker, I move the advancement of LB 7 to E & R for engrossment.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the motion to advance LB 7, and we have a request for a machine vote. We will now vote on the advancement of LB 7. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk. Record vote has been requested.

CLERK: (Read record vote as found on pages 126-27 of the Legislative Journal.) 27 ayes, 6 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance LB 7.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 7 does advance. I might announce now that we will simply stand at ease now while the bill is being sent up to the Bill Drafter's Office, because we do have to receive the bill back today so that it will be ready for Final Reading on Wednesday. So, we will simply stand at ease right now. The indications are it will take approximately an hour to an hour and a half before we get the bill back, but we will stand at
