SPEAKER BAACK: LB 9 fails. We will now proceed to LB 15.

CLERK: (Read LB 15 on Final Reading.)

SPEAKER BAACK: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 15 with the emergency clause attached pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Record vote read. See page 150 of the Legislative Journal.) 17 ayes, 23 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 15 with the emergency clause fails. We will now vote on LB 15 without the emergency clause. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Record vote read. See page 151 of the Legislative Journal.) 14 ayes, 26 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 15 fails. We will now proceed with Item 6 on the agenda, legislative resolution, LR 4.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 4, found on page 107 of the Journal, introduced by Senator Hall.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. President, and members, timing is everything in the Legislature. Timing for this is probably not very good at present but it was an issue that came up dealing with Supreme Court decisions and much like the votes that were just taken they, too, dealt with Supreme Court decisions. Take a look at it. I've passed out a case that basically says that we do have the ability to, because of a subsequent change in the Constitution, to reenact portions of LB 829, specifically the funding portions that would solve much of our financial problems for the short term, for the very short term, and I want to emphasize that, for the very short term. I would like you to just...the reason for introducing the legislation or, excuse me, the resolution was that once it was made fairly public and probably very much specific that we're going to have a second special session that revolved around the issue of the budget and
