solution to that, we want to look at the revenue provisions that we enacted in 829 because we felt they were viable at the time. We reenacted three portions of those and if we need additional revenue, we ought to look to the balance of those first before we look to any other alternatives. That's what the purpose of the resolution is to do, is to put folks on notice to continue to continue to collect those taxes and to recognize the fact that each law on its face has to be ruled unconstitutional by the court before it is unconstitutional and no other prior decision by that court affects another piece of legislation. And those pieces, three portions of 829 funding that were reenacted were reenacted separate and independent from the exemptions that were the cause, in effect, tie that caused for that unconstitutional nature of that revenue. So, for those purposes and for the purpose specifically of trying to ease the burden of the upcoming special session on revenue and budget, I would ask the body to, hopefully, unanimously support the resolution so that folks understand where we're headed and that we can start there, I guess, with a bit of a head start into the next special session. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
