This is the kind of ridiculous point of view offered by this man who is being appointed to the Board of Parole because of his "minority" status. This man has tried to live as a white man all of his life. He identifies with white people. He does not speak Spanish. There is no reason for this man to be appointed to this position. It is a very serious matter. Parole is one of the most difficult areas that the state is confronted with right now, not only because of the problems that were generated because of a misstep made by the Parole Board members in paroling somebody...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who people feel should not have gotten out. But there is the, excuse me, there is the problem of overcrowding and a determination must be made of just whom shall be paroled. With the attitude that this man has evinced toward people of his own ancestry, I feel that in trying to prove his caucasian credentials he will be harder on non-caucasians than the caucasians to validate what he has said that he is. And when these kinds of issues can legitimately be raised and the fact is established from the record of the poor working relationships that he has with the other board members, it would be unwise for this Legislature to confirm this appointment.
