military do in Nebraska, as far as floods and these things that you say the National Guard will be doing?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: The military. What do you mean by the military?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Exactly what you meant. I think you mean active duty people, the Army, Air Force, the Navy, the Marines, or whatever.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, I mean the National Guard did those kinds of things in Nebraska.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So I thought you would say with the scaling back of the military, there will be even more that the National Guard will be called on to do.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I mean simply because the National Guard will not be in places like...they won't be doing things like Desert Storm, there will be perhaps more and more responsibilities at the state level that are more of a civilian nature. That's...I think that's what the guard itself anticipates, according to some of the testimony that we heard.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think my time is up so I won't go further.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Madam President, members, just a point of information that I'm not sure that I've heard discussed so far that did go on during the hearing as far as cutting it back to 50 percent rather than the \$500 cap, and that was that administratively it's on a percentage right now and it would be much easier for the institutions and the guard. The mechanism is set up to merely cut it back the 25 percent. If you went to the \$500 cap and over the years you have a change in tuition, you're going to be...as Senator Warner said, we're going to be coming back and revisiting that number all the time and it would be a real headache trying to determine what that number was going to be as tuitions are different at different institutions. And, therefore, it was just easier to administer and, as I said, it was all...the mechanism was set up to simply do it as a percentage cut-back and, as pointed out, then all institutions would share in that rather than, I think, as Senator Pirsch pointed out, before it was just the universities and the state
