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these areas is a matter of tuitions and that if I wanted to come in and I would say, dear chancellor, we've got room in your classroom, can't we just have a couple more people come in and not charge any tuition and let them sit there for free? You just can't do those sorts of things, that's where you get into tuition remissions and that money comes from somewhere. And that money is going to come out of the general budget of the university and if you take that, that's fine, then you can follow Senator Conway's logic and say, well, you could never cut them unless you reduce the general budget. There's where the policy choice is at. If you want to take more money from the university system, fine, that's an open policy question, take it from their general budget and do it that way. This part of the tuition is that you've already got those built into the budgets and, Senator Moore, I see him strolling down the aisleway. Senator Moore, if I can go on just to make sure I'm accurate in what I'm talking about in terms of the tuition that it isn't a matter of just allowing these people free tuition. This has to do with tuition remissions into a certain effect that you couldn't, for example, your children or my children couldn't just go for free and then I walk in or you walk into the chancellor and say, I'd like my kids to sit in the back because you've got some free chairs back there, that that gets remitted back to the tuition. Is that correct? That comes out of the General Funds of the university.

SENATOR MOORE: Well, obviously, the budget is built...when we factor it in, it's the budget...tuition remissions is the budgeted line that we expect that much. People will go to school for free, for lack of a better term, but there's a budgeted amount that that's allowed to happen.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And when I say lay terms, I'm talking nonappropriations terms. For the lay people out here, that means you're just not going to have that free tuition, that that does come...that gets paid in some manner out of the General Fund budget. If Senator Conway wants to cut the entire university, it would be more appropriate to increase the across-the-board cut for the General Fund of the university rather than do it in this manner.

SENATOR MOORE: Well, that would be the direct impact, it wouldn't be the same, unless, of course, we adjust tuition remissions accordingly at some point in time. That's the second factor that you could do. But if you adjust tuition remissions
