CLERK: Senator Lindsay voting yes. Senator Rod Johnson voting yes. Senator Chambers changing from no to not voting. Senator Beutler voting no.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Roll call vote has been requested. Senators Chambers, Baack, Moore. This is...I'm asking for the senators to please check in since the house is under call. Senator Schmit and Senator Horgan, please check in, and Senator Lamb. We are looking for Senator Lamb. Senator Withem, Senator Lamb is on his way, do you wish to proceed? Proceed with roll call vote.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 87 of the Legislative Journal.) 25 ayes, 19 nays, Madam President.
