

institutions will somehow through their accounting procedures absorb that other 25 percent, or, in essence, as we've discussed on the floor, technically or theoretically, that is that much of an additional cut for them in the interim, but we are not going to let any more students in is what Senator Bohlke's amendment is going to do. So, hopefully, that will clarify the process, but simply voting down the committee amendment at this point, does not, unless Senator Bohlke's amendment would include taking out the 500 cap and changing all those other provisions in there, which, as I read it a minute ago, those weren't there. So you'd still be adversely affecting the students who are on the program now.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Conway. Mr. Clerk, items of the record.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Wesely would like to have a meeting of the Health Committee underneath the south balcony now; Health Committee, south balcony now.

Madam President, amendments to LB 14 to be printed by Senator Warner. A confirmation report from Senator Kristensen as Chair of the Transportation Committee. Enrollment and Review reports LB 12 to Select File, LB 1 to Select File with E & R, and LB 2 to Select File with E & R, all signed by Senator Will. Business and Labor reports LB 30 as indefinitely postponed, that is signed by Senator Coordsen. SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, Senator Conway and I had not had an opportunity to discuss what Senator Bohlke's amendment will do. What the intent is, is to leave the law the way it is now until January, I mean, July 1st of 1993. The way that will be achieved is to reject the committee amendments and we have LB 20. Senator Bohlke's amendment will simply say, strike all new language, reinstate the stricken language. That then puts us right where the law is now.
