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SENATOR LINDSAY: Well, I don't know. It is not specified in the bill. That would be up to the Director of the Department of Administrative Services to determine what movements would take place. There are not positions identified, which ones would go, which ones would stay. They have not been identified at this point.

SENATOR CROSBY: Well, I guess my question is, then, how are we saving? Just by doing this, there isn't any actual savings right now, right?

SENATOR LINDSAY: It is not quantified savings. Yes, there will be savings through an efficient use of resources, but it is difficult to quantify exactly what those savings...

SENATOR CROSBY: But the work still has to be done. Because you move it over to DAS from...thank you, John. Because you move it over from Personnel and combine it into DAS, that doesn't mean that the work doesn't still have to be done. It does have to be done. And computers are not...there still has to be some people to feed the computer, there has to be accountants who know accounting. Those are not all just what I would clarify as clerical positions, people perhaps who run the computers. You have to know what you are doing. You have to know what information to feed. You have to know what you are getting back. And from the very beginning, I simply did not like the idea of taking personnel and putting it into a larger entity. I think the way it stands, and we happen at the moment have, and we have always had, I shouldn't say at the moment, I think Gwen Combs is a wonderful director. I have met her. I have listened to her at hearings and so on and am really impressed with her, and I just don't like to see this particular department melted into another one that would perhaps lose the identity. We still call it Personnel. The current degree, if you have a Bachelor of Science in what we used to call Personnel, it is human resources, people. That is who we are talking about, people. And so I think the people that deal with that and who are concerned with what we are doing each day as far as the jobs that are available, or the job descriptions, and so on, have to know human resources. It isn't just a matter of adding two and two and sticking it into the computer. So I don't know, I guess Senator Chambers took his amendment away at the moment. I might vote for the amendment because I see what he is trying to do, but I am going to vote against the bill. Thank you.
