SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why is that not in the fiscal note?

SENATOR LINDSAY: That I don't know. It was in committee testimony.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Well, it says exactly what you have said before, it makes some reference to a possibility of savings in the future. It does not quantify it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If I told you that I want you to take a law case for me, Senator Lindsay, you functioning as a lawyer, and I say there is a possibility that you might be paid something in the future, would you accept that arrangement for all of your clients who come to you?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Not all of them, but I have made that mistake in the past.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if it was a mistake then, it would be a mistake now, is that correct? In other words, you learn from your mistakes so you wouldn't repeat the same thing you called a mistake now, would you, in your own practice?
