SENATOR CHAMBERS: That you're not going to oppose the bill.

SENATOR MOORE: I am not going to oppose the bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. What would be the impact of this bill on the activities of the Department of Personnel?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, my understanding it would be...it would probably have more impact over in the risk management area of the bill than it did personnel.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I don't want you to answer what I didn't ask you...

SENATOR MOORE: Okay. Well, my understanding is there is little to no change in the role of the Department of Personnel.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what is it being done for?

SENATOR MOORE: So you have the ability to manage state government, and there may, and may is not a good word, there may be the possibility to eliminate some duplication in types of staff DAS, which is a much larger entity, and Personnel now have. You'd give DAS the ability to manage it, and through that management you may find some savings.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you don't really know that that's going to happen right now, do you?

SENATOR MOORE: I never s...no, I never said it was going to happen right now.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, but I don't mean happening right now. Let me restate it. Right now you don't know that that's going to happen down the road?

SENATOR MOORE: No, I do not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, with as little knowledge as you have of this, you think that would be sufficient to revamp all of government? Do you? If somebody came in here with the power to revamp all of government and they had no more knowledge of what they were doing than you have of this bill right now. Would you
