SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Lindsay.

I give the example of work comp, you have, under Department of Personnel, you have the workers that are to be covered, under risk management you have the actual work comp program itself. Those programs have to coordinate right now because you're dealing with two separate departments.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I'm asking you about the Department of Personnel,...

SENATOR LINDSAY: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and what harm is resulting from its existing as a department.

SENATOR LINDSAY: And that's what I was trying to answer.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh.

SENATOR LINDSAY: That is that because...being in separate departments, there is a more difficult time trying to coordinate. There is an efficiency factor that is not being utilized. By not having it done under this bill, by putting it off, as you might suggest, to the future, at least until the next session, we've lost at least one fiscal year and possibly more and any savings that might be able to be accrued.
