to close on your motion to bracket.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Speaker Baack, members of the Legislature, let's look at the economics of this. If you reduce the incentive for people to sign up for the National Guard, you're going to have less federal payroll to the State of Nebraska. If a year from now our guard strength is 75 or 80 percent, instead of the 85 percent it should be, or even 90 percent, you'll have less federal payroll, you'll have...nobody will sleep as well because there won't be as many guardsmen. So, for that reason, I implore you to support the bracket.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the closing on the motion to bracket. We will now vote on the bracket motion. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 3 ayes, 18 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to bracket the bill.

SPEAKER BAACK: The motion fails. We are now back on the amendment by Senator Bohlke. Senator Haberman, did you wish to address that amendment?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes, I do, Mr. Speaker. May I have a question of Senator Bohlke, please.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Bohlke, would you respond, please.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Bohlke, as I understand it, this amendment cuts off the help for the National Guard students July 1, 1993. Is that correct?

SENATOR BOHLKE: That's incorrect.

SENATOR HABERMAN: What is correct?

SENATOR BOHLKE: It reduces it to 50 percent from 75 percent.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Those that are presently getting the 75 percent? It reduces...

SENATOR BOHLKE: It will allow...it will allow all of those who
