who have been here understand that there are ups and downs in the way the Legislature functions, as there are ups and downs other places. It also shows that people who haven't been here a long time can do things that are of value, that people who have been here as long as I have, as long as Senator Schmit has, as long as Senator Warner has, on occasion, will be able to add something to the discussion based on our having been there when something was put in place and can offer some perspective. But in any case, I think, with what the Legislature has done thus far, this bill probably ought to advance. I am not able to vote to advance it because I don't believe that these inducements are what the state should be doing to keep people in a federal program. But to emphasize what I said before, although I'm not going to vote to advance it, I'm not going to do anything to impede its advancement at this point.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Anyone else wishing to speak to the advancement of LB 10? Seeing no one, Senator Moore, did you wish to close on the advancement of LB 10? He waives closing. We will now vote on the advancement of LB 10. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 6 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 10.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 10 advances. Do you have items for the record?

CLERK: Mr. President, I do. Your Committee on Health and Human Services, whose Chair is Senator Wesely, to whom was referred LB 5, instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be indefinitely postponed. That's signed by Senator Wesely. I have amendments to be printed to LB 26 by Senator Schmit; and Senator Chambers to LB 14. That's all that I have at this time, Mr. President. SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We'll now proceed to LB 20.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 20 was a bill originally introduced by Senators Lindsay and Wesely at the request of the Governor. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on September 21st of this year, at that time referred to the Health Committee, advanced to
