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anything as long as he gets what he wants. Well, from the beatitudes I quote to you one of my favorite lines from the beatitudes. Blessed are the poor in spirit, for they shall see the kingdom of God. Well, a lot of these people are poor in spirit, they don't have the spirit or the backbone to stand up to someone and say, no, I'm not going to do that. Again, I just...when you look at the statistics in Nebraska, and if you want to say that 46 percent of the women are unmarried, well okay. We've always had unwed mothers, this is nothing new. One of my keepsakes that I treasure greatly is a book that one of my dear aunts used to keep for the social circle at St. Cecelia's Church in Hastings, that was a forerunner to the Altar Society. And in the twenties, one of the donations that they set a couple of times was \$2 to a certain French priest in Paris, and it was for the benefit of the unwed mothers of France. Those were the unwed mothers that our G.I.'s, in the first World War, left behind. So here were these women trying to help. So my point is that unwed mothers are nothing new. We've had unwed mothers since the beginning of time. I don't judge them, I simply try to remember that what we're talking about here is aid to dependent children. Some way or another we have to try to keep the children going and not lose any more of them than we can help. And when you talk about the elderly and the needy, again, are one of our huge problems because...and Scott Moore admitted that this is what triggered our present session is that Medicaid shortfall. And a big part of the problem with Medicaid is the explosion and escalation of health care costs. I'm happy, pleased any time if we can all sit down, as one of our...maybe a candidate for President, I don't know exactly what he is, but he wants to get everybody in a room and talk about this. Well, maybe that's what we should all do is figure out why...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...health care costs are so high and see what we can do to stop that. But we can't come along and just say because health care costs are high, because a bunch of immigrants who were illegal in Grand Island left some babies behind them, or because these mothers are not married that we can stop this aid, we can't. We have to figure out some way to keep it going. And I don't want anyone to get it that's not entitled to it, and I don't want taxpayers having to pay for people that are not entitled to it and not in need. But maybe then that's because we haven't done our work correctly. So I guess I'll vote for the amendment, if we get to it, but I'm not
