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be now, or later is yet to be determined.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Wesely. Senator Crosby, you're next.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I appreciate Senator Chambers filing this motion for reconsideration because some of you were not here late yesterday, for various reasons. I'm not saying that you should have let your constituents go on and so on if you had meetings and things to go to, but I think I think it's good for us to revisit this particular amendment because it has a twofold thrust and because it was a bill that was heard. And when you talk about the poverty level, that's very important, and the second half of it deals with the 185 percent of poverty guidelines. So I think from that point of view we should vote to reconsider. I wish some of you would enter into the debate because I think you're thinking things but not saying them, and I think you should ask the questions that you want to ask and talk about the ADC program in general. This is an opportunity to do that because some of you have raised questions about people who are on it, or shouldn't be, and that kind of thing. And so I just think this is a good opportunity to bring that all out and talk about it. And when you look at the other thing that was passed around yesterday were the figures and the numbers that Senator Wesely was talking about, about the people who are...this was from the Department of Social Services. This has the statistics on it as to how many are in the program and what the cost is. Senator Rasmussen and I have discussed the possibilities of trying to figure out some way to have an accountability program so we would know what the money goes for. Well, that sounds good on paper, but not that I'm closing the door to that, because I'm not. I think we should look at all phases of the ADC program, just like any other program. And if and when the time comes that we think we could inaugurate or find a way to get an accountability back, so we know what...that the money was spent for what we say it should be spent for, I'm all for that. But that would add another layer, it would add another layer, it would add another form, it would add some kind of reporting system, that's what you have to do. So at the moment I guess our only recourse is if we do know of people we think are not...are misusing the system, that that should be reported to DSS or the hot line, the auditors hot line. We do have mechanisms in place for that. So I hope you're listening this morning, and I hope you will enter into this particular
