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or if you're going to stand for those principles and ensure that those who need the help, those to whom we've given the help, and said legislatively are entitled to the help...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...whether or not they'll continue to receive it.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Crosby, you're next.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. One of my very favorite constituents called in this morning. I've had just a very few calls on this particular issue, people who do not support what I'm doing. Most of my calls are people who think I'm doing something that is worth doing, at least worth talking about. But this woman has worked in her...for a long time in human resources, and with an agency or a business that was in the temporary employment business. And in her work with that she has found that many young women would get a job, a temp, and then quit it if they got pregnant because the welfare payments and so on would give her more money. And I'm very honest about that, I know that that could happen, but I said that yesterday, that if she had a 20-hour a week job at four-fifty an hour, then if she loses a day's pay or something she's behind in her income. So I understand what she's telling me, and I know it does happen. I'm not saying that it doesn't happen, I know it does. But there again it's very difficult for me to say, well, because she left that job or something that we shouldn't help her take care of the baby. The other thing we have to remember, the money that we're talking about are subsistence payments. I know that all the medical payments are still there and so on, and I just want you to keep that in mind that it is subsistence because there are extra expenses when you get pregnant, and also if she loses that job or quits it because she can't keep going if she's not feeling well or something, then her income is down. Also, one of the things she mentioned that young women move to Lincoln or to Nebraska because we do have this program. Well, I know that happens too. And that's one of the problems with our schools here in Lincoln is because of our special ed services, we do wonderful work with special ed children, so people move to Lincoln because of those services. Our schools are bursting, and that's part of the problem because you have to have more room for special ed equipment and so on. So as we go along here
