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and we will have to. Nobody is suggesting that we're not going to have to make tough decisions. I just don't want all the decisions to be made on one group or several groups of those people that Senator Crosby has said time after time today are the most needy. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Further discussion on the amendment by Senator Crosby? Seeing none, Senator Crosby, do you wish to close?

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Yes, I will close quickly. Thank you, Senator Schimek. You have brought out some things that I think really needed to be said and I appreciate that a lot because bringing this amendment was just simply for me another attempt to bring the whole problem to the full Legislature and I think we have done that. If we hadn't had this debate, none of this would have been talked about and we wouldn't have brought out the problems that these young people have. And I think that Senator Rasmussen and others, and I appreciate Senator Wesely sending around his three-page document because there again we see the actual numbers and what happens when these things kick in or do not kick in, the payments. The YWCA, there are all kinds of organizations who have parenting classes, they have financial management for mothers who are on ADC, and they have for teenage pregnancies and that kind of thing they have forums and workshops for job training. They are...our own local YWCA has a clothes closet so these young women who are having a problem and don't have any clothes to speak of can go and get decent clothes so they can go for a job interview. You can't show up in not very nice clothes for a job interview because you have to make a good impression. So all those things are in place. And God bless these young people, they're not very good managers a lot of them. But you think back to your days between 18 and 25. Were you the top-notch manager in the world of your money? No, you weren't because most of us grew up in a sheltered society. We grew up with our parents looking after us. And until you're out there alone, you don't realize how fast \$20 goes in the grocery store. I remember some of the things I did were absolutely stupid when I got first, when I was married, and I was 24 years old. I had always lived at home. I didn't know how much it cost to go to the grocery store. My mother always did that. So I think that's why we have to realize we're talking about young people here who haven't had a lot of experience. And so when you talk about management, I think that's good. We should figure out
