SENATOR MOORE: You can't have everything you want so on this particular issue I probably won't get it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But would you like to if you could?

SENATOR MOORE: Oh, sure. If money wasn't an issue, I would love to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if you were not chairman of the budget committee, some of the issues you push you might not be pushing in the way that you are. Is that correct?

SENATOR MOORE: Most of them I would probably be pushing anyway.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you mean this is really you (laughter).
